Luckily, in my workplace, this kind of experienced people are always around. In the ward, they know all about their patients' information, clinical response and are prompt when doctors ask for desired data. In the operation room, they prepare all the needed equipments before an operation and during the operation. In the doctor's office, they offer efficient and friendly service to comfort patients' emotion. Besides regular duties, whether it is in-hospital activities or visits to at-home patients, the nurses' professional skills and warm-heartedness are always experienced by patients and their family. These are the indispensable roles nurses play in the hospital.

Passing on the Experience - "Know the first step"

In medicine, it is very important to pass on one's experience, especially in the surgical field. The amount of time spent on the job is the key to gain myriad experience. It is impossible to reach it in one-step. From being an inexperienced newcomer to a seasoned professional, and then advancing to become an expert guiding the next generation. This cycle of inheritance happens in the hospital all the time, both on physicians and nurses.

In the operation room, medical students are asked to try the first step - putting on the surgical outfit. Due to unfamiliarity and bewilderment, their hands would always be contaminated while putting on the operating ropes or gloves. Whenever I see a nurse asking them to do it again, it reminds me of my own experience. At that time, I was intimidated by the new environment. I was so afraid that I would contaminate the clean room and bring infection upon the patient. I messed up my first step. It was not much different from the situation I have just seen. Although I learned the procedure in school and practiced it during internship, mistakes still happen for my first time in the operation room. Luckily, under the nurse's patient guidance, I succeeded in putting on the operating rope and gloves correctly.

History always repeats itself. The

scenario described above occurs repeatedly. This is the beginning of inheritance. It is very different from my first impression of nurses while I was a student.

Veteran Nurses Accelerated My Experience Buildup

Compare to seven years of medical school, nursing program only takes four years. Although we started college at the same time, by the time we began practical training, the nursing students are already in internships or have started working.

When I was still an intern, a resident or an inexperienced physician working in the hospital through practical training, I have learned a great deal of the knowledge and experiences from veteran nurses. Especially when I was in my residency, I asked questions on

When I was still a resident, there was a time that I could not make a decision due to a patient's complicated medical condition. I wanted the patient's attending physician to come to the I.C.U. However, I dared not to bother the physician, my teacher, Dr. Chien-Hsin Wang to come just for that matter. Luckily, a senior nurse who knows the physician well was able to "trick" the attending physician to come with just a few words.

Even though he nagged at me for a bit, I was able to fulfill my goal - let the teacher examine the patient and resolve my questions about the patient's critical condition.

When I look at the newcomers, it is like looking at myself entering the medical field. They are anxious yet scared about the uncertain environment and the job. But luckily, big sister nurses take on the role of babysitters, giving them care and chances to learn.

Nurses' continuing education is very important. Although we are medical professionals, what we learn at school is different from performing our specialty at different work environment. Therefore, we should continue our education while cultivate work ethics, learn from diseases and treat patients as families. More importantly, maintain a humble and empathic attitude.

It is really a great pleasure to work with nurses who have the above gualities. It not only makes work smoother, but also provides better quality service to patients. It is such an extraordinary experience.

Due to my duty and personality, I have the opportunity to interact with nurses from different units. I shared with all the nursing staff my personal experience during routine meetings, and discussed their work reports from different perspective. Lately, I have shared my experience on how to search for information and the difficulty in finding what you want.
